BRIEFINGS

- A. Brian Blevins, VDOT No Land Development and no permits issued between 07.19.2023 to 08.21.2023 No work orders. Mowing and brush trimming in the Sinking Creek area started, second round of morning started. Shoulder maintenance on Johns Creek area started. Ditching and shoulder maintenance on 624 (Little Mountain Road). Completed projects, shoulder, and pipe cleaning along Route 42 (Cumberland Gap Road). Mowing along Route 311 (Craig Valley Drive/Paint Bank Road) south bound and adjoining secondary routes. Two Contracted pipe installations: one on rout 611 (Peaceful Valley Road), and one on Route 608 (Mill Creek Lane). Cut sight distance and limbs for school buses. VDOT informational meetings for Craig Botetourt Scenic trail to be held on September 21st, 2023, 4 to 6 pm. Mr. Matyas commented that if they were finished with the patches off of 42. Brian said he would look into it. Mr. Bailey commented on a couple of ditch pipes that were replaced/installed on Peaceful Valley Road. He requested a recheck, because there is a significant difference between the road height and ditch pipe height. Mr. Spence commented on the nice work on 311 with patching the road.
- B. Trace Bellassai, Broadband- There was no update on Broadband.
- C. Bill Wolfe, Preserve Craig County, Mountain Valley Pipeline No Update.
- D. Woody Lipps, Chairman, Craig Valley Railbed Scenic Trail Update- Mr. Lipps briefed the board on the history of how we got here. In December of 1961 the Commonwealth acquired through donation the 307.77 acre tract of land we call the railroad bed, including all the bridges and other improvements at a stated value of \$1.4 million dollars, "for such public use as Commonwealth shall determine". (Commonwealth is prepared to defend their title to this property) The Commonwealth first made public their idea for a hiking and bicycle trail along the route in a plan published in 1973. This planning effort evolved during a series of meetings including various state and Federal agencies, along with local government. An addition to the then existing plan was released in 1987. Then, in the late 1990's planning for the railroad bed trail was again updated in a scenic trail development proposal released in March, 2001. This plan expanded the previous plans and included connections to other roads and trails in the National Forest including Mill Creek and Patterson Mountain. This plan cites a 9 month feasibility study initiated in 1999 that concluded; "the property is a valuable public asset that could support recreation and resource protection in a number of ways". Further, the localities, in cooperation with the state agencies, should pursue funding for construction of a trail facility along the corridor and develop a master plan. (see attached Board minutes) Since 2001, there have been numerous additional studies and plans at all levels; Federal, state and local, that apply to this proposal. In 2008, planning for our 1 mile "Greenway Trail" along the rail bed began and the trail opened in 2012. The fundamental difference going forward throughout this planning process is that, recognizing the potential economic benefit to local communities, the previous efforts envisioned a local funding match. In 2001 it was 20%. Today there is no local funding match required. This is in fact a state project and it has been since 1961.

In 2022, the Virginia General Assembly approved a substantial amount of funding for trails in Virginia and named five priority trails to be funded. The Department of Transportation then advanced \$1 million to each of the five priority projects to fund a comprehensive planning effort to build on what had been previously done. VDOT didn't request the county form a citizens committee, you did that on your own to give the county a voice in planning and to insure regular updates on the process. Speaking for myself, and our committee, we aren't necessarily "for the trail" but we are for a comprehensive plan. This is a planning process we are actively participating in to ensure it follows a logical procedure and includes community input. Make no mistake here, your committee is for our community, those on the route and everyone else. This is a proposal for the future of Craig County and it has been since 1961.

- Chairman Spence thanked Mr. Lipps for his volunteer time and accurate information.
- E. Diane Givens and Jackie, Craig County Chapter DAR- America 250 Representatives asked the Board to sign a proclamation celebrating the drafting of the constitution for the week of September 17th through 23rd as Constitution Week.

WHEREAS, the Craig County Sheriff Department has received a donation for the Hooked on Fishing program in the amount of \$700, this will be added to the balance of the Hooked on Fishing program, and

WHEREAS, the Craig County Department of Social Services each year applies for a Virginia Juvenile Community Crime Control Act grant (VJCCCA) in the amount of \$6,585 and if not used any unused balance must be returned to the Commonwealth of Virginia, and

WHEREAS, the grant was received in the amount of \$6,585 and there were no expenses made from this grant, it is the request that the amount of \$6,585 be returned to the Commonwealth from the Counties Fund Balance from the year of 2022-2023, and

WHEREAS, The Craig Co E911 at this time does not have means of operations in case of an emergency in which the courthouse or the sheriff office may need closed or evacuated, and

WHEREAS, The E911/Sheriff Department has already received funding by a grant that can make an off site connection which includes in the grant is radio connections and the equipment, but does not include computer and software needed to operate the 911 system properly off site at the Emergency Management Center, and

WHEREAS, it is the request of the E911 Department that the sum of \$26,000 be appropriated from the Fund Balance in order to set up the emergency 911 system with computers and software needed to operate the county efficiently and effectively with the E911 system in case of emergencies, now

WHEREAS, the Craig County Public School has the unused balance of \$717,873 in the School operating fund as of 6-30-23, traditionally the County BOS request that all Carry over money be appropriated into the School Capital Improvement Fund 301, however in order to meet the budget for the FY23-24 year the BOS has agreed to allow a portion of this funding in the amount of \$78,608 to balance the schools operating budget which has already been approved and appropriated into the school fund 205 and,

WHEREAS, the amount of \$546,848 is the remaining balance from a School Construction Grant Program Entitlement and must be used only for eligible expenditures listed by the requirements of the Grant and it must also be held in Escrow for the School of which is a requirement by the Grant, and due to these restrictions it must also be appropriated back into the School Operations Fund 205, and

WHEREAS, the remaining balance of \$92,417 can and will be appropriated into the School Capital Improvement Fund 301, now

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Board of Supervisors of Craig County that the Fiscal Year 2023-2024 budget is hereby amended as follows:

AT A REGULAR MEETING OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORSOF CRAIG COUNTY, VIRGINIA, HELD AT THE CRAIG COUNTY COURTHOUSE ON THURSDAY SEPTEMBER 7th, 2023 RESOLUTION SETTING THE ALLOCATION PERCENTAGE FOR PERSONAL PROPERTY TAX RELIEF IN CRAIG COUNTY FOR THE 2023 TAX YEAR

WHEREAS, in accordance with the requirements set forth in Section 58.1-3524 © (2) and Section 58.1-3912 (E) of the Code of Virginia, as amended by Chapter 1 of the Acts of Assembly and as set forth in item 503.E (Personal Property Tax Relief Program or "PPTRA") of Chapter 951 of the 2005 Acts of Assembly and qualifying vehicle with a taxable situs within the County commencing January 1, 2023, shall receive personal property tax relief; and,

WHEREAS, this Resolution is adopted pursuant to Ordinance # 05-11 which was adopted on December 13, 2005.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF CRAIG COUNTY, VIRGINIA AS follows:

- 1. That tax relief shall be allocated so as to eliminate personal property taxation for qualifying personal use vehicles valued at \$1,000 or less
- 2. That qualifying personal use vehicles valued at \$1,001-\$20,000 will be eligible for <u>25.80</u>% tax relief state.
- 3. That qualifying personal use vehicles valued at \$20,001 or more shall only receive 25.80 % tax relief state, on the first \$20,000 value; and
- 4. That all other vehicles which do not meet the definition of "qualifying" (for example, including but not limited to, business use vehicles, farm use vehicles, motor homes, etc.) will not be eligible for any form of tax relief under this program.
- 5. That the percentages applied to the categories of qualifying personal use vehicles are estimated fully to use all available PPTRA funds allocated to Craig County by the Commonwealth of Virginia

- 6. That entitlement to personal property tax relief for qualifying vehicles for tax year 2005 and all prior tax years shall expire on September 1, 2006, or when the state funding for tax relief is exhausted or depleted. Supplemental assessments for tax years 2005 and prior that are made on or after September 1, 2006 shall be deemed 'non-qualifying' for purposes of state tax relief and the local share due from the taxpayer shall represent 100% of the assessed personal property tax.
- 7. That this Resolution shall be effective from and after the date of its adoption

A public hearing was held at the Planning Commission in which conditions would be placed on the permit that Mr. Trivette would need to meet every year.

REPORTS AND INQUIRIES FROM THE BOARD

Mr. Collins reported that the Governor announced yesterday afternoon that New Castle received a a grant for \$50,000.00 for AFID for local food systems, for the Farmers Market.

Mr. Spence took a moment to thank Woody Lipps for his accurate information.

Mr. Matyas, asked for an update on the Farmers Market. Mr. Collins said we are hoping to have it ready by Fall Festival.

HEAR THE PUBLIC

Mary MacDaniel 281 Creek Trail Road, New Castle- She is concerned for neighbors who are on the trail, and opening up the trail to people who don't live here. Her concerns are property damage and child safety.

Jim Statlander 2228 Old Railroad Oriskany- From a recent Citizens meeting, Mr. Statlander attended, recalled quotes from an article. He recently read an article "Herds without Hunters, Division of Wildlife Services" that hunting was on the decline. From the article he mentioned that

rural areas are steadily decreasing and hunting license sales have also decreased. This will have an negative impact on managing deer populations. He is concerned that the three miles of the trail will effect hunting in the area mostly regarding parking.

Vickie Grahm, 2193 Old Railroad, Oriskany – Attended a Citizens meeting, where Delegate Austin and Mr. Kelly from VDOT were in attendance among other stakeholders. Mr. Kelly invited attendees to join at the table and to comment. Ms. Grahm main concern is the emergency road and wanting easy access to it in case of flood. She invited the Board of Supervisors to a citizen meeting an exhibit that Derail has organized, the Fish at the library on Saturday morning or Monday afternoon.

Todd Price 77 Lignite Road, Eagle Rock- Concerned that the maps are not detailed enough. He is hoping at the recent meeting the maps will be more specific. He is researching, deeds, and surveys.

Chip Cressman – 11176 Peacefull Valley Rd, New Castle, Wilderness Adventure – Feels the trail is a unique opportunity offering families and the community a place to walk, bike, horse back in a safe environment. Added benefit, local businesses will feel an impact, folks visiting the trail will stop in the local stores and stay at local lodging areas. He encouraged local folks to go the meetings VDOT is having to dissipate misinformation.

James Ledford 32 Virinia Springs Rd, New Castle-Opposes the trail, he is concerned that his house is too close to the trail. He is worried about his children and people walking on the trial. He is worried about being able to hunt and his privacy
